

### **All Through Schools**

Many educationalists favour this model of schooling because:

- > It eliminates any unsettling transition between the primary and secondary stages.
- > Familiarity with staff, routines and expectations.
- > Consistent pedagogical ethos.
- > Having all ages on site also enables older pupils to act as mentors for younger children.
- Primary pupils benefit from having specialist teaching (science, arts, PE and languages) available and sharing sports facilities that stand-alone primaries can't offer.
- > Economies of scale allow greater spending on teaching and learning.
- ➢ Greater range of extra-curricular activities.

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What is the Early Years Foundation Stage? The Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) is the stage of education for children from birth to the end of the Reception year.

It is based on the recognition that children learn best through play and active learning.

When children join an Early Years class at Saint George's, we want their experience to be happy, active, exciting, fun and engaging.

We will support their development, care and learning needs and ensure they feel safe and secure.

How do we do this?





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Spend time getting to know your children – we will carry out visits to your child's pre-school or nursery setting and speak with their keyperson.	Carry out home visits to see you and your child in their home setting.	Hold parents meeting for new parents to discuss school, expectations and routines.

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### Our Curriculum at Saint George's



Our curriculum is hands-on and creative and covers all subjects and areas of learning.

Our curriculum is very active and lots of learning involves physical movement; using senses, through movement, songs, use of the outdoors.

We work hard to develop an effective **Growth Mindset.** We are teaching the children to get excited by challenge and that it's ok to make mistakes as these are learning opportunities. Within class we embrace effort, persistence, trying different strategies and learning from mistakes. The sky is the limit – we can succeed with whatever we set out to do! <u>Some things may just take a little longer</u> than others!

#### We learn how to read!

Every day we learn a new letter, the sound the letter makes, and how to form the letter. We practice writing in the air, on each others backs, on paper, in paint, in sand. The list is endless. We use the letters we have learnt to make up and read words. As we learn more letters the number of words we can read increases.

Once the children know all their initial sounds we move onto blends. As the children's finger strength and letter formation improves, we move onto using handwriting books. We use Letter-join to teach handwriting.

We follow Little Wandle letters and sounds programme.









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#### Maths at Saint George's

Every day we have our Maths Mastery whole class learning activity.

This is where we introduce new learning and consolidate previous learning. This is usually a 20minute session followed up by the opportunity to participate in games and activities linked to the learning of the day.

Activities are set out during child- initiated learning time and adults in the room will play alongside the children. Sometimes an adult will lead a directed maths-based activity then step back and allow the children to lead the learning and teach one another whilst the adult observes the children leading their learning.







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#### Inside / Outside

Children have free flow access to both indoors and outdoors. There are opportunities for learning in both areas come rain or shine!

We build ramps for cars to travel down in our building area and measure how far they go.

We role play outside

We enjoy mixing and measuring in our mud kitchen.

We develop new games to play and teach them to others.

Children have wellies and waterproofs in school.



#### Forest School

- We have weekly forest school sessions at Saint George's, across all year groups. Lots of our staff are Forest School trained.
- Children take their learning outside.
- Opportunity to explore the outdoors freely but safely.
- Children are encouraged to take risks and manage their own risks.
- We develop team-work, resilience and independence.
- Activities may include; den building, climbing trees, using tools, forest art, measuring sticks, tree/leaf identification.



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Children are given the opportunities to explore the whole curriculum through enticing activities set up within the classroom.

Adults ensure there are activities set up to cover all areas of the curriculum. We ensure children do not gravitate towards one specific area by observing interests and acting upon them.





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Throughout the year we monitor children's progress and inform parents of their 'next steps' in learning. These targets are updated regularly throughout the year to show children's development and areas where they need further support.

Any child falling behind or showing difficulties are identified almost immediately and extra support given. If they continue to struggle interventions are put into place.



### Parental involvement is paramount in building great home / school relationships.

Parents are involved in their children's learning through:

- 1. Invites into class for reading, sharing afternoons, stay and play sessions.
- 2. Communication through contact books
- 3. Use of Tapestry (online observation journal)
- 4. Parent consultation evenings
- 5. Weekly updates on children's learning (class newsletters)
- 6. Open door policy.
- 7. Weekly open-door sessions after school.









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#### Wraparound Care

Breakfast Club - 7:30-8:35am £4 (£3 for siblings)

After School Club - 3:10-4:30pm £5 (£4 for siblings)

After School Club – 3:10-6:00pm £9 (£8 for siblings)

Both provisions are led by the same adults and both clubs run from the school hall. If children are attending an extracurricular club until 4:15pm, they can attend after school club afterwards if needed.







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#### How can you prepare your child for school?

- Encourage them to get dressed by themselves
- Put on coats, shoes, socks.
- Encourage them to go to the toilet independently – this includes wiping their own bottom!
- Talk to your child.
- Read them stories
- Play games and take turns
- Sing nursery rhymes and counting songs
- Learn how to use a knife and fork
- Say please and thank you
